

John Lucas Demonstration on making a Goblet

Turning a goblet By John Lucas

Take a blank about 3 ½ x 10. Mount it between centers. Turn it round. Turn a tenon on one end for your chuck. Mount it in the chuck with the tailstock up for support. True it up and then turn most of the outside of the goblet bowl. Don't turn it all the way down to the stem size. Hollow out the inside. Check the wall thickness frequently. When you get near the bottom finish turning the outside and then finish the inside hollowing. I use a Hunter #5 or a negative rake scraper to finish the inside. Sand the bowl inside and out before turning the stem.

Use the parting tool to mark where the bottom of the goblet will be. Just cut down ¼" or so. Then turn the base and stem. If it's a long skinny stem I turn an inch at a time down to the final size starting at the bottom of the bowl. The stem will be stronger and the bowl won't wobble as much if the stem is tapered. If the bowl starts to wobble turn the speed down a little. If you don't have a variable speed lathe put a tennis ball or other ball of appropriate size on the tail center and gently push that up to the goblet. You don't want to put any pressure on the goblet. You want just enough to stop the wobble.

When you have finished turning and sanding part it off. I part it off so the bottom is concave. I usually part it most of the way leaving about ½" tenon. Then I use the toe of the skew to clean up the bottom. Then part the last little bit off and carve it away. I sand the bottom using a drill chuck in the lathe headstock and hold my 2" sanding discs.

To finish the goblet the best thing according to the experts is thin epoxy. If the epoxy is watery enough just spread some inside the bowl and then wipe it out. Let this cure and do the same thing. If it's not very thin or watery mix a little alcohol with it until it is the consistency you want. The outside can be just about anything you want but I prefer to use something that can be gently washed a lot like Minwax wipe on poly.
