

The discussion covered the use of epoxy, the different kinds of epoxy and their uses. Epoxy creates heat, so be careful of internal cracks in the wood. Do not use green wood with epoxy. Epoxy does not like moisture. Use moisture content of 12 %b or less.

Also talked about was the use of pressure pots and their uses. Using a vacuum for stabilizing and pressure for removing bubbles.

Mixing Mica powder or liquid color into the epoxy can create a great effect. Epoxy can also be used to fill voids in burls

Another method of finishing is called slow turning (See Steve Sinner). While the piece is rotating at 10-60 rpm, apply a heavy coat of poly. Or, apply several coats of thin finish after each coat dries. Sanding in between. There are several different finishes, shellac, poly, tung oil, walnut oil, etc. Mike Mahoney's Walnut oil is recommended because of his refining. After the finish has dried completely, you can buff. Use the red rouge on dark wood and the white rouge on light wood.

Another finish that was discussed was CA Glue. The preferred brand is Parfix because it does not smell bad and it has a longer work time.

Watco Danish oil is fast and easy.

Yorkshire grit is a good was of removing the very fine scratches from sanding.

Be aware of the use of the project. Will is be used for food. If so, use a "Food Safe" finish. Will it be display only, or will it be handled often. This should determine what finish to apply.
