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EMBELLISHING YOUR WORK BY JAKE NEIDLING

Making a Flower Demo

There are many types of Flowers. I will talk about and demonstrate making A Lily and a Rose
Looks Complicated, easy, very little carving needed

Green Wood: Fruit tree preferred.

Pros:

- Ductile, Easy to carve, shape
- Easy to turn
- Can use coping saw and only cleanup edges.

Cons:

- Difficult to sand- I don't do any sanding except between petals or leaves.
- Cracks: Stress relief No sharp points, constant curves, constant thickness
- Clogs carving bits
- Solution: soak in oil to displace water.
- Wet wood-check chuck tension every time you walk away for awhile.
- Dry wood: I would carve more instead of using coping saw-brittle

Lily:

Pictures on internet Printed template for petals, enlarged and made other size printouts then transferred t thicker material.
Make a thin undercut disk (One side concave and one convex) and mark petals with template and cut with coping saw, (round blade vs Flat)
Turn thin tendons for Stamens & garnish with glob of gold paint for pollen.

Rose:

Simple multiple layers made from ever smaller goblet cups. Glued together with super glue.
Turn Stem and leave thin tenon to be utilized to align Layers.
Green wood blank 6 by 3 inches.

Make leaves:

The leaves are made from goblet cups with the leaves marked freehand and cut with coping saw and sanded. I drill hole for alignment tendon before cutting off with Japanese saw.

Petals:

Ever smaller Goblet cups rotated so openings between petals don't align.
Make first cup (mine is 3 inches wide by 1.5 deep)
Before cutting off cup draw freehand petals. And drill tenon hole.
Cut openings between petals and round off petals with coping saw on lathe. (You could also carve the openings. I prefer round coping saw blade (harder to get stuck).

Cleanup on lathe or carving stand.

Carving:

You can use a Dremel or high speed carver.-RAM products.
If you use Dremel recommend upgrading carving /sanding bits (MDI is a good source)
Foredom is very useful and fast with Sabre bits.- Gentle touch.
Finish sand with Brian's Sanding rods (dowels or flat pieces of wood with sandpaper glued to them) if desired.
